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need and risk, requiring a level of social work involvement beyond the low-resource and low-oversight model that generally accompanies a child in need categorisation," their report said.

A child's needs are seen as complex when they are not fully met due to their range, depth or

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significance. They may prevent the child from achieving or maintaining a reasonable standard of health and development without the intervention of more specialist and intensive services from the

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Local Authority.

The UK's four nations -

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What is a child protection plan? A child protection plan is a plan drawn up by the local authority. It sets out how the child can be kept safe, how things can be made better for the family

Child protection systems help children access vital social services and fair justice systems - starting at birth. They reach out to the most vulnerable

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children, including those with disabilities; girls and boys who have been placed in alternative care; children uprooted by conflict, poverty and disaster; or those who may become victims of child labour or

into armed groups.

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From the Preface: This manual, Child Protective Services: A Guide for Caseworkers, examines the roles and responsibilities of child protective services (CPS) workers, who are at the forefront of every

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community's child protection efforts. The manual describes the basic stages of the CPS process and the steps necessary to accomplish each stage:

intake, initial assessment or investigation, family

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assessment, case planning,
service provision,
evaluation of family
progress, and case closure.
Best practices and critical
issues in casework practice
are underscored throughout.
The primary audience for

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this manual includes CPS
caseworkers, supervisors,
and administrators. State
and local CPS agency
trainers may use the manual
for preservice or inservice
training of CPS caseworkers,
while schools of social work

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may add it to class reading lists to orient students to the field of child protection. In addition, other professionals and concerned community members may consult the manual for a greater understanding of the

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child protection process.

This manual builds on the information presented in A Coordinated Response to Child Abuse and Neglect: The Foundation for Practice.

Readers are encouraged to begin with that manual as it

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addresses important information on which CPS practice is based-including definitions of child maltreatment, risk factors, consequences, and the Federal and State basis for intervention. Some manuals

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in the series also may be of interest in understanding the roles of other professional groups in responding to child abuse and neglect, including:
Substance abuse treatment providers; Domestic violence

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victim advocates; Educators;
Law enforcement personnel.
Other manuals address
special issues, such as
building partnerships and
working with the courts on
CPS cases.

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Each year, child protective services receive reports of child abuse and neglect involving six million children, and many more go unreported. The long-term human and fiscal consequences of child abuse

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and neglect are not
relegated to the victims
themselves -- they also
impact their families,
future relationships, and
society. In 1993, the
National Research Council
(NRC) issued the report,

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Under-standing Of Child Abuse
and Neglect, which provided
an overview of the research
on child abuse and neglect.

New Directions in Child
Abuse and Neglect Research
updates the 1993 report and
provides new recommendations

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to respond to this public health challenge. According to this report, while there has been great progress in child abuse and neglect research, a coordinated, national research infrastructure with high-

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level federal support needs
to be established and
implemented immediately. New
Directions in Child Abuse
and Neglect Research
recommends an actionable
framework to guide and
support future child abuse

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and neglect research. This report calls for a comprehensive, multidisciplinary approach to child abuse and neglect research that examines factors related to both children and adults across

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physical, mental, and behavioral health domains--including those in child welfare, economic support, criminal justice, education, and health care systems--and assesses the needs of a variety of

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subpopulations. It should also clarify the causal pathways related to child abuse and neglect and, more importantly, assess efforts to interrupt these pathways.

this volume examines the
'meanings' specific child
protection cases involving
the familial sexual abuse of
adolescent girls hold for
social workers. This is
achieved through a
qualitative analysis of a

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series of interviews with
social workers regarding
current or recent cases. The
analysis reveals various
influences on social
workers' practice: the
organisation and
administrative structure of

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child protection,
governmental requirements to
interagency coordination,
the abused girl, her family,
and the skills and
limitations of the social
worker. The findings point
to a series of tensions

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between social workers' perceptions of appropriate intervention practice on the one hand and organisational needs, the demands of the criminal justice system and client choice on the other. This leads to

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recommendations for improved
in-service training,
including joint training for
social workers and police
officers, and a review of
the transitional procedures
between child protection and
adult services.

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
